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

#### **WORLD PREMIERE**

From a solo to an octet, mixing thirteen performers, eight short dances and four musical compositions, *petites danses* becomes a study in perception. Set to the music of Rodney Sharman, Linda C. Smith, Nick Storring and James Tenney, I was interested in how our perception of a musical work is shaped through different choreographic propositions. Those four musical works are imagined with moving bodies twice, resulting in eight distinct dances each with its own visual landscape. I am inviting you to witness how the movement allows us to see the beauty and complexity of each musical composition. Like a collection of short stories, *petites danses* lives inside one book filled with eight unique narratives.

**Kate Story** is a writer and performer. A Newfoundlander living in Ontario, her first novel *Blasted* (Killick Press) received the Sunburst Award for Canadian Literature of the Fantastic's honourable mention; subsequently she has been published in World Fantasy Award-nominated and Aurora Award-nominated collections, and featured in ChiZine Publication's Imaginarium: Best Canadian Speculative Writing 2015. She is the 2015 recipient of the Ontario Arts Foundation's K.M. Hunter Award for her work in theatre.

Darryl Tracy is a Toronto-based independent dance artist (choreographer, interpreter, teacher and producer). He is a senior faculty member at the School of Toronto Dance Theatre and as a dancer has created many roles by most of Canada's leading choreographers. He was part of the company Sylvain Émard Danse in Montreal for over 4 years dancing and touring in Émard's Temps de chien. He has created over 30 of his own works through commissions and self-produced productions. Most recently, he has choreographed a work for Connection Dance Works (NB) to premiere in 2017-18. He most recently performed for Lesandra Dodson - Fredericton, NB. and will create a new work with her as a dancer in January 2017. He is also performing for Marie-Josée Chartier in her upcoming tour of petites danses. Darryl works part-time as a neuro-based rehabilitation physiotherapist with Physio-Logic Neuro Rehab and University Health Network-Lyndhurst Center.

Juan Villegas is a Colombian Canadian dance artist, who works in dance, performance art, and video. He works with improvisation and collaboration, exploring themes such as identity, equality and pushing boundaries of physicality. Juan has a post-baccalaureate diploma in contemporary dance from Simon Fraser University and a degree in industrial design from Emily Carr University. Juan has been dancing professionally since 2012 when he joined Paras Terezakis' company Kinesis Dance Somatheatro in Vancouver. He performed with the company for two seasons before moving to Toronto in September of 2013. Juan has also performed in Darryl Tracy's work another way of telling you a durational movement installation part of the Rhubarb Festival. In the past he has performed with the 605 Collective, Vanessa Goodman, Shawna Elton, Judith Garay, Rob Kitsos, Tiffany Tregarthen and Tara Cheyenne Friedenberg. Juan is also a Yoga and Pilates teacher.

Simon has received five Dora nominations for outstanding lighting design, winning the award twice, and is a member of the Associated Designers of Canada.

Lucy Rupert is a freelance dance artist and theatre performer and the artistic director of Blue Ceiling dance, an umbrella for work she creates, commissions, performs and tours. With twenty years professional experience, Lucy is known for her raw and articulate individualism and vulnerability in performance. Lucy has performed in works by Allison Cummings/Theatre Passe Muraille, William Yong, Sashar Zarif, Anandam Dance, Puppetmongers Theatre, Volcano Theatre and Circus Orange, among others. She has collaborated long-term with two renowned companies: Theatre Rusticle since 2001, and Fujiwara Dance Inventions since 2010. Lucy has appeared in two BravoFact dance films, and won Dance Magazine's Editor's Choice award for her own film "The Window". Lucy has a Joint B.A. in Dance and Music from the University of Waterloo, an M.A. in History from the University of Toronto, is a Chalmers Fellowship recipient and a 2015 nominee for the K.M. Kassi Scott is a Toronto-based dance artist. She is featured in site-specific dance films by Body in U, which has been apart of 7 international film festivals and awarded Best International Documentary at Girona Film Festival 2015. As an independent dancer and collaborator, she has performed and developed works with Trisha Brown Dance Company (New York), MAU (New Zealand) and Coleman Lemieux & Compagnie (Toronto), among others. Kaitlin Standeven was a member of Toronto Dance Theatre for eight seasons, Kaitlin Standeven was a collaborator in the creation of five original full-length works by Artistic Director Christopher House. With a renewed commitment to her role as an interpreter and keen interest in collaborative endeavors, Kaitlin continues her work now as an independent artist. Kaitlin was the recipient of an OAC International and National Residency Grant, which she completed in Montreal in the spring of 2016. She holds a BFA from Ryerson University.

**Brodie Stevenson** was born in the small village of Wuikinuxv on British Columbia's central coast. As an independent dancer, Stevenson has had the immense pleasure of working with many notable choreographers including Julia Aplin, Peggy Baker, Marie-Josée Chartier and D.A. Hoskins. From 2008 – 2014 Stevenson was a member of Toronto Dance Theatre, where he created multiple original roles in works by Artistic Director Christopher House and performed for guest choreographers such as Lina Cruz, Deborah Hay and Heidi Strauss. For seven seasons he toured across Canada with the outdoor festival Dusk Dances. He is a Dora Award nominated performer and choreographic recipient with Throwdown Collective.

As a choreographer Mairéad creates both independently and collaboratively with Throwdown Collective. In 2016, she and her collaborators were honored to receive a Dora Mavor Moore Award for Outstanding Choreography for *Various Concert*. Mairéad is a student of Women & Gender Studies and Sociology at the University of Toronto and serves as an executive member of the board of the Canadian Alliance of Dance Artists.

Shannon Litzenberger is a Toronto-based dancer, choreographer, creative facilitator, arts consultant and advocate. She has collaborated with some of Canada's leading artists including Marie-Josée Chartier, Susie Burpee, Michael Greyeyes, Lorna Crozier, Christopher Dewdney, David Earle, DA Hoskins, Noah Richler, Heidi Strauss, Darryl Tracy, and David Pressault. Through the umbrella of her company Shannon Litzenberger Contemporary Dance, she creates innovative multi-disciplinary productions that explore timely social issues using contemporary dance in concert with other mediums like storytelling, film, visual art and poetry. #### **BIOGRAPHIES**

A multi-faceted artist, **Marie-Josée Chartier** moves easily between the worlds of dance, music, opera and multi-media in the roles of choreographer, performer, director, vocalist or teacher.

Her choreographic works have been presented nationally in dance series and festivals such as the Canada Dance Festival, Dancing on the Edge, New Dance Horizons, Tangente, DanceWorks, and abroad in Potsdam, Prague, Vienna, Paris, Gent, Singapore, New York, Bogotà, Mexico and Santo Domingo. Ms. Chartier has received numerous choreographic commissions notably *Vestige* for Toronto Dance Theatre, *fifty-one pieces of silver* for Dancemakers, *étude pour deux mammifères* for Kaeja d'Dance, *La Lourdeur des Cendres* for Four Chambers dance project, *A short voyage* and *Terrain* from Jolene Bailie, and *How to Wrestle an Angel* for Old Men Dancing. Her work has been the subject of documentary films shown on national television and in diverse film festivals.

She is the recipient of numerous awards notably the 2001 K.M. Hunter Artist Award, the 2015 Jacqueline Lemieux Prize, nine Dora Mavor Moore Awards nominations in categories of choreography, direction and performance, a finalist for the Muriel Sherrin Award from the Toronto Arts Foundation honoring International Achievement in Dance. She won the 2002 Dora for *fifty-one pieces of silver* and shared with the collective URGE two Dora awards for *And by the way Miss*. Since 2000, Marie-Josée Chartier has been active as a director in music, multi-media and opera productions and collaborates regularly with Queen of Puddings Music Theatre, the Gryphon Trio, Toca Loca, Tapestry Opera and l'Ensemble Contemporain de Montréal.

Marie-Josée Chartier's performing career has taken her on international and national stages as a freelance artist and with dance companies from Montreal and Toronto. She is a sought after guest teacher in major training centres and universities in Canada as well as in Latin America in the field of modern dance, movement for singers and musicians, voice exploration and improvisation.

Jim Angel, Paul Clifford, Chris Lemieux and Peter Earle are members of Old Men Dancing: Peterborough's Old Men Dancing was formed in 2002 by a group of men, with an average age of over 50, who share an interest in creating movement-based performance. These late-blooming dancers teamed up with the professional dance company Atlas Moves Watching under artistic director Bill James. They have commissioned new works from some of Canada's most renowned choreographers including Marie-Josée Chartier, David Earle, Bill James, Tedd Robinson, D.A. Hoskins and Allen Kaeja. Their first full program of works played to sold out houses at Market Hall in Peterborough, the Registry Theatre in Kitchener and at Harbourfront Centre in Toronto. They continue to create their own works including *Legacy* and *Fathers and Sons*. They will be performing a full program again at the Registry Theatre in Kitchener on May 4th, 2017.

Martha Cockshutt (Costume Designs, Coordination, Construction) is a Peterborough based theatre artist. She has been creating costumes for theatre, dance, and performance for over 30 years. She first costumed Marie-Josée Chartier in 1987, and spent 22 years waiting for another opportunity to work with her. Martha has designed and built costumes (and sets too) for Magic Circus Theatre, 4th Line Theatre, Writers' Workshop Theatre, Mysterious Entity, and scores of independent artists and projects. She has also executed sewn elements for larger works by visual artists, participated in numerous script development workshops and produced several larger works. Greatest hits include *The Cure for Sexual Jealousy* (Cure Collective), *Skirting the Edge* and *Macbeth* for Six (Mysterious Entity), some very sexy drag for performance artist David Bateman, *Stria* (Chartier danse), *The (Post)mistress* (O'Kaadenigan
