taught dance in the integrated arts program at Peter-borough Collegiate for eight years, and is currently working in schools as an independent artist/teacher,

specializing in contact movement.

Four Forms From China, Greg Magwood performs four styles of martial arts. These include "Si Fa Do" (The Falling Snow Saber) in which the movements invoke the which the movements invoke the feeling of snow being blown by the wind, and and "Hang Tsche Pan" (The Monkey Stick), which portrays the most devious of the martial arts animals, the monkey. Magwood has been an instructor in five styles of martial arts, working out of his home in Madoc.

In Spill, choreographer Pene-

lope Thomas performs an up tempo solo for a woman and a chair in which the woman experiences the constantly changing rhythms of her

emotional life. In the end, she finds that in life, as in dance, no place is so certain that you can't tip over. Thomas is one of Peterborough's busiest mod-ern dance teachers. Recently, she has been involved with choreography for theatre, including Black Well Theatre Company's production of Goodnight Desdemona, Good Morning Juliet, and TASS's produc-tion of Anything Goes.

choreographer/dancer Rya Shankman, together with six young student dancers, takes the audience on a lyrical journey that leads from harmonious beginnings to iso-lation, insecurity, vulnerability, and

ultimately to the place where the magic never dies.

Here With Me, choreographer Christy Stoeten's piece is set to the music of the same-titled song by Dido. In her performance, Stoeten will explore one's struggle to stay true to oneself in a chaotic world. Stoeten has been studying modern, ballet, jazz, tap and highland dance in Peterborough for the last 15 years and has been teaching jazz

dance for two years.

She has performed in numerous musicals with the Peterborough Theatre Guild, including a lead in Crazy For You.
