Welcome to the first show in Peterborough New Dance's 1999-2000 season, our 6th year of presenting Canada's best independent dance artists. Consisting of four works, by Kate Alton, Doug Varone, Mitch Kirsch and Peggy Baker, Calculated Risks was first presented by Overall Dance at the Dancemakers Studio in Toronto just a few weeks ago. Biographies

Kate Alton: Kate is an independent dancer and choreographer living in Toronto. She trained at the National Ballet School, the Royal Winnipeg Ballet School and the School of the Toronto Dance Theatre. In 1991 she studied in New York City with Risa Steinberg, Christine Wright, Donald Byrd and others at the Cunningham studios. As a featured member of TDT from 1989-95 she performed many solo roles and toured internationally. Since then she has diversified by working with many choreographers including Laurence Lemieux, Michael Downing, Mitch Kirsch, Sarah Chase, Bill Coleman, David Earle, Doug Varone and David Pressault. In 1997 she performed with the Dutch company Leine & Roebana in Toronto and Holland and was also nominated for a Dora award for Outstanding Performance. Her choreography has been presented in Toronto at Spring Rites '97, Susanna Hood's The Ides of May at Myth Productions, Tarragon Theatre, Volcano's Short Stuff, TDT's choreographic workshops, the Arts and Letters Club, in Winnipeg at the Gas Station Theatre, as well as two shows with Overall Dance - at the Blyth Festival, and at Dancemakers last year.

Peggy Baker: Peggy Baker is one of Canada's greatest dance artists. She was a founding member of Dancemakers (Toronto, 1974), toured internationally with the New York based company of Lar Lubovitch throughout the eighties and performed with Mikhail Baryshnikov in the inaugural season of his and Mark Morris's White Oak Dance Project. Since 1990 she has performed primarily as a solo artist at home and around the world, frequently sharing the stage with classical pianist Andrew Burashko. Recent projects include concerts with Paul-André Fortier, Margie Gillis and Molissa Fenley and appearances with the Amici Chamber Ensemble and the Toronto Symphony. In addition to her distinguished performing and choreographic career, Ms. Baker is recognized as one of the modern dance world's finest teachers, and has taught throughout Canada and abroad, and is the first Artist-in-Residence at the National Ballet School of Canada.

As this will be the premiere for much of this program, let's keep At the Market Hall Theatre.

Cécile Bélec: Cécile Bélec has been designing and constructing sets, costumes and props for theatres in Canada and Europe for the past fifteen years. She hasearned two Dora Mavor Moore nominations for Outstanding Costume Design, one Dora Mavor Moore Award for Outstanding Set Design and the Pauline McGibbon Award for Design in 1996. Cécile's designs demonstrate a unique interest in concept development, exploration of materials and methods, and a sensitivity to detail. Her interest in the discipline and form of dance is well rooted in her fascination with form and space through the language of sculpture. Her ability to realize and give form to this crossing of disciplines is

demonstrated well in her work with Dog Troep (Holland), The Hill Project (Holland), The Tea Lady (Groundswell), The Barber of Seville (Theatre Columbus), and in her ongoing work with Overall Dance.

Allan Day: It is with great pleasure that Allan finds himself amid such a talented company. Past credits include production assistant, Caravan Stage Co. (Wolfe Island); Technical Director, theatre 5 (Kingston); and Set/Lighting Designer for Moon Children, forbidden Donut (Toronto). Allan attended Ryerson's theatre tech programme and received an education from too many Rock 'n' Roll gigs. It's so nice to work on an art form...

Janet Johnson: After graduating from York University's dance program, Janet spent ten years in Toronto. While there, she co-founded the eclectic company Pedestrian Waltz Dance Project, whose work was performed on rooftops, in galleries and on sidewalks, as well as at the Canada Dance Festival, Vancouver's Dancing On The Edge and Danceworks' Mainstage series. Since 1994, Janet has been choreographing independently through various commissions and with the assistance of the Laidlaw Foundation. She has danced for numerous choreographers, including Denise Duric, Darcy Callisoin, Conrad Alexandrowicz, Julia Sasso, Kim Frank, and more recently, Karen Kaeja, Catrina von Radecki and Dance Theatre David Earle. Janet's love of teaching has enabled her to teach at Ballet Jorgen, the Toronto and North York Boards of Education, the Hamilton Ballet School, McMaster University and Waterloo University, among others. Currently Janet lives in Guelph, where she is co-director of the Guelph Contemporary Dance Festival.

AND THIS.. 4-DAY PHYSICAL THEATRE WORKSHOP WITH CLAUDIA MOORE & CO.

Participants will explore the creative process of making physical theatre, with an emphasis on developing voice and movement skills. Mitch Kirsch: Mitch Kirsch was born in Los Angeles and started dancing while majoring in comparative literature at UC Berkeley. He performed with Toronto's Dancemakers and Toronto Dance Theatre, and was a founding member of Desrosiers Dance Theatre. Mitch left Toronto for New York in 1981, where he performed and toured with a variety of companies, studied composition and technique with Merce Cunningham, and ballet with Maggie Black. In 1987 he turned his attention to his own choreography, founding Dogs in Space, with Jane Townsend, as a vehicle for their choreographic work. Returning to Toronto to live in 1993, he has presented his dances in full-evenings of work by Dogs in Space in 1994, in 1996, at the Art Gallery of Ontario. Mitch choreographed a septet, Good Vibes, for Toronto Dance Theatre in 1998. His work was seen last season at the duMaurier Theatre in Toronto, in the Toronto Dance Theatre's season at the Premiere Dance Theatre and the Joyce Theatre in NYC, and as part of a Dogs in Space program in Peterborough.

Steve Lucas: Steve has designed for some of Canada's most innovative theatre companies and traveled throughout the world with Robert Lepage's Le Polygraphe. Since 1987 he has done the sets or lighting for more than 100 productions including the original and touring versions of 2 Pianos 4 Hands (Mirvish Productions, Tarragon Theatre), Poor Superman (Canadian Stage/Manitoba Theatre Centre), Romeo & Juliet (The Dream in High Park), Jump (Da Da Kamera), Sleeproom (Theatre Passe Muraille), Body and Soul (Crows Theatre), Assassins (Eclectic Theatre), and Jata Mu Hing Rahule (Rakvere Theatre, Estonia). He has been nominated for twelve Dora awards, winning twice.

Heather MacCrimmon: Heather MacCrimmon does costumes for independent dance, theatre and film in Toronto, and internationally with Théâtre de Complicité. She is currently working on Jim Allodi's feature film. The Family Man.

Fred Malpass is a freelance theatre technician currently attending Sheridan College. He has designed lighting for both theatre and dance shows in the Ottawa area, and has collaborated with Meagan before. This is his first costume design.

Ross Manson: Ross is a Toronto-based producer, actor and director. He is the founding Artistic Director of Volcano, the founder of Toronto's Group of Seven Theatres, and programmes the local arts cabaret series, Short Stuff. This is Ross's third show as a producer with Kate Alton & Overall Dance. Ross's next shows are Faust at the Tarragon and Building Jerusalem at the Factory Theatre.

Michael Sean Marye: Sean Marye began his dance training in Buffalo and continued at the schools of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, Les Grands Ballets Canadiens and Toronto Dance Theatre. He performed with TDT from1986 until 1998. He has also worked with Conrad Alexandrowicz, Bill Coleman, Allen Kaeja, Laurence Lemieux, Julia Sasso and Holly Small. In 1995 he partnered Veronica Tennant in Timothy Findley's stage version of The Pianoman's Daughter. His choreography has been shown by TDT (collaborating with David Earle), Spring Rites '98 (Toronto) and at the MacPherson Playhouse (Victoria). In 1997, Mr. Marye assisted James Kudelka in remounting Fifteen Heterosexual Duets for Ballet B.C. Sean Marye was also the founder of Breaking Ground, a contemporary dance training programme in Toronto.

Gillian Smith: Newfoundlander Gillian Smith trained at the School of the Toronto Dance Theatre and the Martha Graham School in New York City. She performed with the Danny Grossman Company in Kingston, Ontario and in their 20th anniversary season at the Premiere Dance Theatre. Gillian has worked with independent choreographers Kate Alton, Mitch Kirsch, Terrill Maguire, Denise Duric and Darryl Tracy, and was featured in Overall Dance's last two shows - in Toronto and at the Blyth festival. This year, Gillian will be joining the modern dance company, Trip, in Winnipeg.

Heidi Strauss: Heidi Strauss began dancing in her hometown of Sudbury and continued training both abroad and at the School of the Toronto Dance Theatre where she was a scholarship student. For the last five years she has danced for a number of choreographers including Conrad Alexandrowicz, Mitch Kirsch, James Kudelka, Laurence Lemieux, and Peter Randazzo. Now a faculty

member at the School of TDT, she also teaches at Humber College. Her own choreography has been presented at Dances for a Small Stage, the DuMaurier Theatre, the Tarragon Theatre, and fFIDA. In the year 2000, she will present a duo show with Darryl Tracy called the Four Chambers dance project.

Penelope Thomas lives in Peterborough, where she teaches dance, meditates when she remembers to, photocopies things for Billy the K, writes, has tea with Anne and Janette, recovers from the first twenty years of her life, does contract work on her computer, and practices being grateful for being alive. Penelope has had two pieces presented by Peterborough New Dance and has performed in several works by other local artists. She sometimes thinks about moving to a bigger city again to become a "real dancer", but somehow keeps coming to the conclusion that she is learning more doing it in this (slightly haphazard) way.

Jane Townsend: Jane Townsend begn her dance training as a child in her native Montréal. She later trained at York University and the Toronto Dance Theatre School before moving to New York City, where she spent twelve years dancing, choreographing and costuming for the downtown dance scene. She studied extensively with Merce Cunningham and performed with a great many choreographers, including three years with Douglas Dunn and Dancers. She is the co-artistic director of Dogs in Space. As a costumer, Jane has created clothing for a myriad of Toronto and New York choreographers and companies, including Peggy Baker, James Kudelka, TDT and Dogs in Space.

Doug Varone: Doug Varone was born in Syosset, N.Y., and attended Purchase College where he received his BFA. He danced with the Limon Dance Co. from 1978-79, and with the Lar Lubovitch Dance Co. from 1979-86. He formed Doug Varone & Dancers in 1986. This company - based in New York City - has appeared at some of the most prestigious festivals and theatres in the world, including the Kennedy Centre, the Joyce Theatre (NYC), Queen Elizabeth Hall (London), the American Centre (Paris), the Kalamata Festival (Greece), the Korean International Festival, the American Dance Festival, the Tokyo Festival, and Jacob's Pillow. Mr. Varone has created over thirty dances for the company, and created works for more than two dozen companies internationally. The company has won five New York Dance and Performance awards (Bessies), including a 1998 honour for Sustained Achievement in Choreography. Mr. Varone also works extensively in theatre (on and off Broadway), television, opera and film. In Canada, Mr. Varone has worked with Dancemakers, Peggy Baker, Rhombus Media (on the film, The Planets), and now, with Kate Alton.

Laura West: Laura West began studying dance with Maureen Eastick in Victoria, British Columbia and continued at the Banff Centre for the Arts, Simon Fraser University, and the School of Toronto Dance Theatre. She was a member of TDT for three years, and performed the works of David Earle, Christopher House, Mitch Kirsch, Peter Chin, Tedd Robinson, Claudia Moore and James Kudelka. She has performed independently with Dance Theatre David Earle, Sasha Ivanochko and Michael Sean Marye. She is currently pursuing a degree in political science at the University of Toronto.

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
