





BIOGRAPHIES

Nicole Bauberger is happy to be directing and designing Hitting In Public, seeing as how painting and drawing and figuring out how to hang her paintings in trees in parks and performing and writing and getting stuff into the Women's Street Paper and the Peterborough Review and designing posters and teaching math and creative writing workshops somehow doesn't seem to quite suffice.

Pierre Blin earned a degree in Cultural Studies and Environmental Studies from Trent University, where he was involved in numerous Theatre Trent productions. This is his directorial debut. His interest and short experience with certain eastern and native healing practices has heavily influenced his work on *Hist Whist*. He hopes to continue practicing fine arts, healing arts and horticultural arts.

Stephanie Corrin has studied ballet with the Royal Winnipeg Ballet and the Ottawa School of Dance, studied modern dance with RWB and Le Groupe de la Place Royale in Ottawa, and since coming to Peterborough, has expanded her movement studies to include circus arts. She has danced and performed in numerous productions at the Market Hall and Union Theatre, including roles for Footfall Dance Theatre and, most recently, in Man With A Bag Heart.

Stephen Elliott has been an actor, director, playwright and sound-effects guy with Theatre Trent, Magic Circus Theatre, *The Greatest Show* (Peterborough Festival of the Arts), and The Peterborough Theatre Guild. He has performed the parts of Galileo, Hamlet's ghost, a deranged doctor, and the bad guy in a Christmas children's play. He has directed Edward Albee's *Seascape*, and helped make the video *Parts*, which won a prize at the Kingston International Film and Video Festival.

Steacy Harper performed the role of Mary Osborne in The Fourth Line Theatre's *The Great Farini* in 1994. To prepare for the role, she trained with Nicki Dewhurst and studied trapeze and low wire with Marsha Kennington at the Main Space Circus School in Toronto. In addition to her recently acquired circus arts skills, she is also an accomplished singer: she did four years of vocal training at the Royal Conservatory in Toronto and performed as a back-up singer in Arbour Theatre's 1994 production of *Fire*. She has performed important roles in more than a dozen plays since 1989, including most recently *Dae For Non* at the Union Theatre.

Kristine Keating is a choreographer, dancer and teacher. Since 1992, she has choreographed more than a dozen works of dance, including Full Circle ShatterCycle, presented by Peterborough New Dance in Emergency #2. Kristine co-directed Footfall Dance Theatre in Peterborough for two years and is currently teaching dance at The Academy of Dance and the Integrated Arts Programme at Peterborough Collegiate.

Anne Ryan, a Peterborough native, earned a degree in Dance from York University, and returned to Peterborough to explore dance through performance, choreography and teaching. Since 1989, she has taught numerous dance courses, classes and workshops, and choreographed more than a dozen works, including *The Clothes Make The Man* presented by Peterborough New Dance in Emergency #2. Her most recent work - *Momentary Losses* - was a collaboration with Ryan Kerr, with whom she will create a new piece to be presented by Peterborough New Dance in April.

scooter began his dancing career in Emergency #1 in 1993. Since then, he has created a number of dance or movement pieces, including Ed (in Emergency #2), Keep People As Pets, Res Ispa Loquitur, and most recently QUASH. In 1994 he performed the acrobatic role of Lulu in The Fourth Line's The Great Farini. scooter and Patrick Walsh will create a new piece - lighter in tone than Kitten... - to be premiered by Peterborough New Dance in March.

Welcome to Emergency # 3, our third annual program of new dance and performance by artists living in the Peterborough area. The 1995 version is larger than ever, with two programmes at two locations. This is due mainly to the fact that we are presenting both premieres and works in progress, an acknowledgement of what was in fact reality during the previous two Emergencies, when we ostensibly presented only premieres. For new work to develop unencumbered by the demands of a premiere, it often needs to go through a public workshopping stage, hence our decision to broaden the mandate of Emergency. Originally aimed at emerging artists only (hence the name), its purpose is now twofold: to give the careers of emerging artists a boost by providing a professional production experience; and to give established artists the opportunity to try out new work. Selection of the pieces in Emergency #3 was done by a sub-committe of Peterborough New Dance last fall, after an open call for proposals. 

LAURENCE LEMIEUX



Laurence Lemieux is a choreographer, dancer and photographer born in Quebec City, now based in Toronto. From 1986 to 1994, she danced for Toronto Dance Theatre, in addition to performing for numerous independent choreographers, including Bill Douglas, Bill Coleman, Julia Sasso, Conrad Alexandrowicz and Murray Darroch. In her young career as an independent choreographer, she has already garnered much critical praise. Of her solo Crosswalk, to be performed in Peterborough, Deirdre Kelly wrote, "Lemieux demonstrates tremendous concentration in executing a series of perfectly captured physical shapes...and the pictures she presents are stark and sculptural: the body as a sork of art."

Laurence will be in Peterborough for a five day residency from April 18 to 22, during which time she will work with students in both the regular and French immersion programmes at Prince Of Wales School.



Conrad Alexandrowicz was raised in Ottawa, Canada, where he loathed physical education and dreamed of being an archaeologist. In 1978 he graduated from the Dance Programme at York University, and up until 1987, danced for some of Canada's premier modern dance companies, including Paula Ross, Contemporary Dancers and Dancemakers. In 1987 he set up his own company, Alexandrowicz Theatrical Dance, now based in Vancouver. Freely traversing the border between dance and theatre, combining original and adapted text with highly inventive movement, and often employing high comedy, Alexandrowicz challenges the viewer's ideas about such issues as gender and power, as well as the nature of performance itself.
