

Artist Biographies

George Barron's dance career started 5 years ago after being "discovered" by michael hermiston. He was a founding member of Old Men Dancing and most recently appeared as the prettiest of the Old Men in *Cupid and Death*. George is ecstatic to be working with Barbara Dametto.

Allyson Booth trained at the School of the Toronto Dance Theatre, and has performed in works by various Canadian choreographers. She has choreographed and performed in Peterborough for the Emergency dance festival, 8 to 8, and Bare Essentials. She has recently moved to Guelph, but is thankful she is still able to be part of the Peterborough Dance Collective. She also holds a Bachelor of Health Sciences degree and works full-time as a midwife.

Stephanie Booth studied dance at Ryerson's Theatre School as well as at the School of the Toronto Dance Theatre, where she graduated in 1996. Since then Stephanie has been teaching, choreographing and performing in the Toronto and Peterborough areas, as well as in Sydney, Australia, where she spent a year on an exchange. She is thrilled to have the opportunity to perform her sister's choreography again.

Barbara Dametto is a recent addition to the Peterborough dance scene. Since moving here from Toronto 3 years ago, she has been involved in many dance events including: Emergency Dance Festival, 8 to 8, Bare Essentials, and most recently the Peterborough Dance Collective's From the Floor performance. Barbara is a graduate of the University of Waterloo's Dance and Theatre program and also holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts Education from York University. Presently. Barbara leads local Modern and

Ecstatic dance classes and is the resident dance teacher at P.C.V.S.

Kevin Fitzmaurice

Anna Gartshore is a graduate of the full time acting program at Ecole Philippe Gaulier International School of Theatre in London, UK and Paris. France. In Canada she has trained extensively in clown, neutral mask and physical theatre with Lana Morden (Vancouver), Dean Gilmour (Toronto) and Daniel Baillargeon (Montreal). She now resides in a church outside of Peterborough where she actively pursues her commitment to the arts in small centres. In 2003 she conceived, co-created, co-directed and performed de Builder danse and de Danse moderne with Kristine Keating for Emergency 11 and Phaedra with Jim Gleason. Most recently Anna was the Movement Director for The Lyric Stage's production of Cupid and Death by Christopher Gibbons and Matthew Locke.

Charlie Glasspool is, like Melissa Webster (see below) a lover of all and likes to accordionate dance.

Formerly an alternative elementary school teacher, actor/director, painter, presently michael hermiston is a choreographer / composer / musician, poet / playwright. His longtime interest in social justice issues, human rights, children's voting rights and bicycling activism confirm the widely held belief of his family and friends that he hasn't really figured out what he wants to "do". Well, he really does simply want to just "be", but gets distracted and seduced by the different dancing muses which find him oh so attractive and ... michael can't turn down an offer to dance or play. Michael's latest passion has been the composing of choral music. Two samples of his Botanical Choral Series were danced to in the recent Emergency #13, and all five of the series will be performed in June as choral pieces standing alone.

Described by the Toronto Star as "so far ahead of the mainstream that his works remain unique long after their premieres," Bill James is a choreographer and artistic director who challenges his art and his audience. Bill came to dance following study in architecture, theatre and fine arts. He began his career as a dancer in 1975 with Le Groupe de la Place Royale in Montréal and Ottawa, working with choreographers Peter Boneham and Jean-Pierre Perreault among others. He left that company in 1985 to specialize in the creation of site-specific work. He has fused many elements: dance, singing, poetry, design, photography, video, and architecture in unconventional locations. In 1997 Bill created his own dance company called Atlas Moves Watching Dance Projects to encompass all of his professional activities. Continuing to buck trends, in 2003 Bill moved himself and his company to an old farm on the Indian River near Peterborough. Since then he has run a number of community vouth art projects in conjunction with Peterborough New Dance and Y.E.S., the Youth Emergency Shelter. Progress Avenue, premiered in October 2004, was the first full-length work Bill has created since moving to the area.

Kristine Keating is a Peterborough-based. Canadian Independent choreographer and dancer. She received her dance training in the Honours Bachelor of Arts Dance Program at the University of Waterloo. She co-founded Footfall Dance Theatre in 1992 and has been choreographing, dancing and directing for the past two decades. For the past 10 years, Kristine's choreography has reflected her interest in Contact Improvisation and natural movement. She has trained and worked with Allan & Karen Kaeja, Danny Lepkoff, John Lefan, Bill James and Pam Johnson. Original works by Kristine include de danse moderne, In Tension, Missiles, Chop, Art, Politics, and Double-O-Bondage. She has performed in Calgary, Peterborough, Montreal and Toronto. Her work Identity Suite, set on highschool student dancers, won the Award for Choreography at the Sears Drama Festival 2000. Kristine has worked extensively for Peteborough Collegiate's Integrated Arts Program; University

Teachers in training; Board of Education Professional Development days; and as an Artist in Education through the Ontario Arts Council.

Melanie McCall is an emerging artist who returned to Peterborough after attending Nova Scotia College of Art and Design, where she received a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Textiles. While in Nova Scotia she also attended Dalhousie University for an intensive one-year study in Costume Design. Because of these experiences, Melanie's work has been influenced by the multi-disciplinary eduction that is nurtured at N.S.C.A.D., and her passion for unconventional costume. The inspiration behind her work is to blend the traditional textile practice, with her collective art experience. The result creates unique textile art that reflects her eye for texture, depth, dimension and form.

Anne Ryan creates articulate and gestural solo and small group dance works. Her organically derived vocabulary explores the unfolding of the inner self and the connections to the larger external environment. Anne has been working as an independent dancer-choreographer in the Peterborough area for the last fourteen years. Her work has been presented by Peterborough New Dance in the Emergency festival, in the Moving Cultures Series produced by the Peterborough Arts Umbrella, and in self-produced evening-length programs. Over the past two years Anne has developed the Bare Essentials Dance Project which provides a venue for dance artists to present work in a minimalist setting (no lighting, live music) encouraging continual development of works-in-progress. Anne graduated from York University in 1989 with a Bachelor of Fine Arts Honours degree in dance. Most recent works include a suite of four dances in a series called *Elemental*:. Anne teaches modern dance and yoga, and has a private practice in the healing arts.

David Skelton (lighting design) is thrilled to be working with the Peterborough Dance Collective. He has recently been designing sets, lighting and/or costumes for Nakai Theatre, Tapestry New Opera, Theatre Direct and Crow's Theatre. David is looking forward to illustrating Mitch Miyagawa's new script *CARNAVAL*.

Kate Story is a performer, choreographer and writer who creates original performance works. Recent collaborations include the ongoing The Cure for Sexual Jealousy (and other true tales of loves lost and found) with Martha Cockshutt, Susan Newman and Susan Spicer; Biology as Peepshow with artist Caroline Langill; Agoreyphilia with Ryan Kerr, Martha Cockshutt, Curtis Driedger and John MacEwan; and a creative partnership with Curtis Driedger which has resulted in several touching and unrepentantly weird performances (Streets of Laredo, Tonight the Bottle, and Open Season on Blood Organs). She has performed in works by Bill James, R. Murray Schafer, Claudia Moore, Mysterious Entity and 4th Line Theatre, and takes her work to the big smoke now and again (Hysteria festival, Rhubarb!, the fringe Festival of Independent Dance Artists). She performs endlessly in various Emergencies.

Melissa Webster, activist, student, and lover of all, returns to the stage amidst critical acclaim over her dancing debut at last year's 8-to-8.

THE PETERBOROUGH DANCE COLLECTIVE is a group of dedicated local dance and physical theatre artists.

Eager for a chance to present their work professionally, Allyson Booth, Barbara Dametto, Anna Gartshore, michael hermiston, Kristine Keating, Anne Ryan and Kate Story banded together last year, and have set about turning Peterborough's dance scene inside-out.

A wildly successful Dance-A-Thon in January, in partnership with Ploughshares, raised money for tsunami victims. In February the Collective published a calendar of local dance events, from West Coast Swing to modern dance, arts camps, English Country Dance, Queer Dances, dance films, and the Anishnaabe Maanjiidwin event at Trent University. Mayor Sylvia Sutherland has declared March to be official Dance Month in Peterborough. The Collective has been offering free workshops in Modern Dance Technique, Ecstatic Dance, Contact Improv, and Text and the Body.
