#### **BIOGRAPHIES**

Bill Coleman has been turning his gaze outward from dance ever since they put windows in the ballet academy, all while continuing to live comfortably within the dance world. He has performed with Bill T. Jones/Arnie Zane and Company, Tere O'Connor, Dublin City Ballet, Wiesbaden Ballet, Toronto Dance Theatre, Holly Small, and William Douglas Dance. In New York in 1988, he received the Jerome Foundation's First Light Award (the only Canadian ever to do so) for Baryshnikov: The Other Story. Baryshnikov was presented in Peterborough in 1987, followed by Heartland in 1992; Glory Days, an autobiographical work featuring performances by his parents, Audrey and Joe, and brother, Robbie was performed here in 1994; and The Brothers Plaid, and Syl & Ng were presented in 1997. Coleman has been commissioned to create dances for Toronto Dance Theatre, Dancemakers, and the Canadian Children's Dance Theatre. Coleman is currently a guest artist with the New York-based Martha Graham Dance Company, and in collaboration with Laurence Lemieux, is developing a programme of duets commissioned from Margie Gillis, James Kudelka, and Tere O'Connor.

Michael Downing is an award-winning independent filmmaker, choreographer and dancer. Downing trained at the National Ballet School of Canada, and has subsequently danced with the Boston Ballet, the National Ballet of Canada, and the Merce Cunningham Dance Company. Since 1990, he has choreographed work for many of North America's leading classical companies including the National Ballet of Canada, the Pennsylvania Ballet, the American Repertory Ballet Company, and Ballet British Columbia. Downing is the founder and director of the company dancefront which has performed site-specific pieces in the financial districts of large Canadian cities. Downing's dance films have been aired on Bravo!, CBC's Adrienne Clarkson Presents, and the Moving Pictures Festival of Dance on Film and Video. He is most recently the recipient of the Grande Prize in the 1998 Napolidanza Choreografo Elettronico International Festival of video dance.

**David Morrison** has specialized in lighting design for ballet and modern dance since 1983. David was technical director and resident lighting designer with the Danny Grossman Dance company for ten years. His work is also in the repertoire of The Royal Winnipeg Ballet, Le Gala des Etoiles, Dancemakers, Alberta Ballet, Ballet B.C., Ballet Florida and Compania Nacional de Danza, Mexico.

David Parker has been described by Jennifer Dunning of the New York Times as being "...among the most interesting modern dance choreographers working in New York today...David Parker suggested an astonishing amount about art and social custom, with subtelty and humour." His work with his company, the Bang Group, has received critical acclaim in the United States and in Europe. Parker's training includes a degree in Dance from Bard College, four years at the Merce Cunningham studio, and studying composition with Bessie Schönberg. He has taught composition at the Alvin Ailey school and Harvard University. In 1998 alone, Parker has completed a teaching residency at the Pro Danza Italia festival in Castiglioncello, Italy, presented an evening length program at New York's Dance Theatre Workshop, received a First Light Grant through the Joyce Mertz-Gilmore Foundation, and performed at the University of Arkansas and the Tampa Bay Performing Arts Centre.
