RUBIES - inspired by the Goddess Lalita, "red as the rising sun, radiance of passion". Lalita is a Tantric goddess and embodiment of energy. The piece is inspired by descriptions of Lalita in the esoteric Sanskrit text Lalita Sahsranama, The Thousand Names of Lalita.

The choreogarphy explores feminine strength, beauty and divinity using Chhau, a martial dance style from the state of Orissa in eastern India. Chhau is traditionally practiced by male dancers. This choreography brings the technique onto the female body within the mythology of the Goddess Lalita whose strength and sensuality provide an ideal context for the use of this vibrant and earthy vocabulary. The choreography also extends traditional Chhau movements into contemporary dance, evolving the one out of the other.

Rubies is a celebration of the rising and flowing of life force, of energy and vitality. The intensity of inner awakening is experienced in intimate encounters with nature. These encounters, captured on video, create a visual narrative of the inner and outer landscapes of the spiritual journey including its fears, vulnerabilities and triumphs.

Finally, *Rubies* is also an acknowledgement and an example of global exchange and retribalization. It brings together elements from a remote tribal culture with the "urban tribal". It builds a creative link between dancers and artists in Canada with those in remote villages in India. This is a post-modern reality.

Biographies

DEEPTI GUPTA, CHOREOGRAPHER:

Deepti Gupta is a Toronto based dancer/choreographer and a world class exponent of Kathak, classical dance of North India. Recipient of 3 NAC commissions and a Banff Centre for the Arts Residency, her work is at the cutting edge of contemporary South Asian dance in the Diaspora. Her choreographies have been critically acclaimed in the New York Times, the Village Voice and Dance Connection Magazine. Gupta is a relentless experimentalist with a variety of theatrical interests. In 2002 Deepti was awarded a Dora Mavor Moore Award for Best Costume Design for Rasik Arts' production of UMRAO. She also received the MyBindi.com award for Outstanding Classcial Dancer, the Chalmers Art Fellowship to create her new work Rubies and a humanitarian award from Manjari Sankuratri Memorial Foundation. Deepti's works have been performed in Canada, New York City, London and New Delhi in venues as varied as the Rivoli in Toronto to the Arlington Hotel in Maynooth, the NAC Theatre and the Great Hall of the National Gallery.

LESTER ALFONSO, VIDEO:

Lester Alfonso came out of the York University Film and Creative Writing program in 1994 and has worked in Toronto, Montreal, New York City and London, UK as a videographer, editor, producer and director. He is known for experimental non-fiction films like the one minute episodes of the *Mixtape Chronicles*, as well as a series of documentary interstitials for the Nickleodeon network about the everyday lives of children in Malaysia. His recent personal film project, *Trying to be Some Kind of Hero* has been screened in Toronto, New York City, and earned him the award Best New Movie Maker at the Optic Nerve Film Festival in Peterborough. Most recently, his "films with live acts" (including Techno-Bondage and Zero) present live dance, musical and spoken-word performances linked to multiple video projections.

ROBIN DAS. COSTUME DESIGN:

Award winning theatre director and designer Robin Das has been teaching at the National School of Drama, New Delhi for over 20 years. He has directed and designed over 60 theatre productions including Sanskrit Classics, contemporary Indian plays, Western classics and experimental theatre. He is acknowledged as one of the foremost designers of Indian theatre creating productions that blend ancient knowledge with contemporary elements, and moving smoothly from formal scripts to surreal movement scenarios.

BRADLEY A. TRENAMAN, LIGHTING DESIGN:

Mr. Trenaman has designed lighting for The VIRSKY Ukrainian Dance Company's North American Tour, *Leslie Nielson as Clarence Darrow* at the Royal Alex, OMO

Dance Company, The National Ballet School, The Banff Centre, Menaka Thakkar Dance Company, Chimera Project, Chitralekha Dance Company, Janak Khendry Dance Company, Chess the Musical and Wozzeck/Woyzeck at The Bathurst Street Theatre. He has also lit such Canadian bands as Esthero, The Skydiggers, Dream Warriors and Punjabi by Nature. His company, Radiant Concepts Inc., provides projection media (custom gobos) and lighting consultation to clients throughout North America. Brad is a member of The Society of Television Lighting Directors, sits on the board of Associated Designers of Canada, and is a freelance writer with articles published by Professional Lighting Magazine.

ANGOLA MURDOCH, STAGE MANAGER:

Angola is founder of Phenomenatrix Productions. Fader Monkey.

MELISSA ADELLA KRAMER, DANCER:

Melissa Kramer studied 14 years of Ballet at the Victoria Carter London Dance Centre's professional programme, completing her Intermediate Exam with the Society of Russian Ballet. She furthered and expanded her studies in yoga, martial arts, street theatre and contemporary dance throughout Canada. She is an alumni of the School of Toronto Dance Theatre Summer Intensive (2001) and has also studied with Spirit Wind Internal Arts Society. She has been with Arzoo Dance Theatre since July 2001, and continues to perform her own works, both solo and group.

KYLA MAY KOWALSKI, DANCER:

Kyla Kowalski is trained in modern dance, tap and African dance. She has trainned in the Toronto Dance Theatre's professional programme, as well as with the Winnipeg Contemporary Dancers. Kyla teaches movement, dance and acrobatics to all ages. Her performance experience ranges from musical theatre to contemporary independent dance and has been with Arzoo Dance Theatre since 2001.

JENNA MORRISON, *DANCER*:

Having begun her formal training in the Dance program at Canterbury High School in Ottawa, Jenna Morrison's career in dance was fostered by Peter Boneham at Le Groupe de la Place Royale. Her training led her to Montreal where she spent two years at LADMI. where she studied under Linda Rabin, Candice Loubert, Mark Boviin, Tassi Teekman, Peggy Baker & Christopher House. Currently she is a member of the Arzoo Dance Theatre. Ever since Jenna can remember, dance has been essential to her. As a dancer and a mover since birth, movement it-self has become the signifier of the vitality of Life. Life is a journey where emotion is set to provoke motion.
