The creation and production of Stria have been supported through creation and production grants from the Canada Council for the Arts, the Ontario Arts Council and the Toronto Arts Council, a one week residency at Circuit-Est Centre Chorégraphique in Montréal and three residencies in Peterborough through the support of Public Energy.

In early 2008, I started to consider the making of a new solo work for myself. I had been extremely busy directing and choreographing for other artists and felt the need to refocus on my own creations. After a much deserved period of refuelling in the fall of 2008, I went to the studio and started investigating the creative process of Stria. Initially triggered by autobiographical material, I started to excavate the many layers of memories and stories that make up one's life. I worked in concentrated periods of time: at each stage, the form, content and structure kept transforming. New layers were discovered, examined, sculpted, distilled and archived. Very much like the process of a palaeontologist, finding parts of a dinosaur and trying to reconstruct the full skeleton. While bringing all the pieces together, a history is revealed; just like life, it is not linear or logical. I invite you to let your imagination travel with me in this landscape of strias.

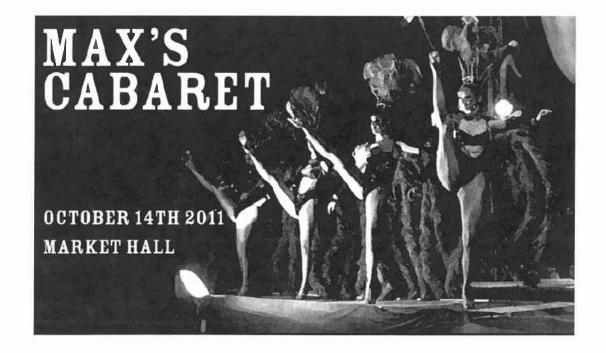

BIOGRAPHIES

Marie-Josée Chartier- choreographer/performer

A multi-faceted artist, Marie-Josée Chartier moves easily between the worlds of dance, music, opera and multi-media in the roles of choreographer, performer, director, vocalist or teacher. Her choreographic repertoire is greatly influenced by contemporary visual art, music and literature in terms of concept, composition and dynamic structure. From there, personal themes weave themselves to create works that try to decipher, expose or deconstruct the vulnerability of human beings. These choreographic works have been presented in dance series and festivals in Canada, Europe and Latin America.

In 2003, Marie-Josée Chartier founded Chartier Danse in order to support her creative activities. She believes in bringing contemporary artists of diverse disciplines from the beginning of the creation to allow the development of layered, meticulous and integrated work. Acclaimed productions of large scale projects with extraordinary artists came to life such as Red Brick celebrating composer Michael J. Baker with Arraymusic, Contes pour enfants pas sages with PPS Danse, Screaming Popes inspired from painter Francis Bacon with fabrik Potsdam, Germany and Bas-Reliefs inspired from painter Betty Goodwin, with Danse-Cité and eleven collaborators from Montréal and Toronto.

Ms. Chartier has received numerous choreographic commissions from solo artists and companies notably Vestige for Toronto Dance Theatre, fifty-one pieces of silver for Dancemakers, étude pour deux mammifères for Kaeja d'Dance, La Lourdeur des Cendres for Four Chambers dance project and How to Wrestle an Angel for Old Men Dancing. Her work has been the subject of documentary films shown on national television and in diverse film festivals. She is the recipient of the 2001 K.M. Hunter Artist Award, nine Dora Mavor Moore Awards nominations in categories of choreography, direction and performance, a finalist for the Muriel Sherrin Award from the Toronto Arts Foundation honouring International Achievement in Dance. She won the 2002 Dora for fifty-one pieces of silver and shared with the multidisciplinary collective URGE two Dora awards for And by the way Miss.

Since 2000, Marie-Josée Chartier has been active as a choreographer and director in music, multi-media and opera productions and collaborates regularly with Queen of Puddings Music Theatre, the Gryphon Trio, Toca Loca and l'Ensemble Contemporain de Montréal. She continues to dance and her performing career has taken her on international and national stages as a freelance artist (originating roles in many of Bill James's works) and with dance companies from Montréal and Toronto most notably with Dancemakers. She is also a regular guest teacher in major training centres and universities in Canada and Latin America in modern dance, movement for singers and musicians, voice exploration and improvisation. Projects for the 2011-2012 seasons include: touring of Stria, Canadian touring of Contes pour enfants pas sages, dancing for Sashar Zarif in Solos of my life, performances of La Lourdeur des Cendres at the dance:made in canada festival, directing, HOMEbody for Shannon Litzenberger, Histoire d'amour for BoucharDanse upcoming international residency in Berlin, and the ongoing national and international touring of opera and multi-media works.

Ruth Madoc-Jones - director /dramaturge

Ruth Madoc-Jones is an award-winning performer, dramaturge and director of theatre, dance and new opera. Selected directing credits include SPIN (Buddies in Bad Times Theatre), Beauty dissolves in a brief hour (Queen of Puddings Music Theatre), Shudder (Humsoundart/La Chapelle/Buddies in Bad Times), Madness of the Square (Cahoots Theatre Projects/Factory Theatre), Bird Brain (LKTYP, 2009 Dora Nomination Best Production), Stitch – an a cappella opera (Urban Vessel/Free Fall Festival/Theatre Centre, 2008 Dora Nomination Best Production, Opera), a nanking winter (Nightwood Theatre/Cahoots Theatre Projects), The Drawer Boy (Theatre Passe Muraille), The Gladstone Variations - Requiem for a Hotel (Convergence Theatre, 2009 Dora Nomination Best Direction & 2007 Outstanding Production - NOW Magazine) and Dreary and Izzy (Native Earth Performing Arts). Upcoming Free As Injuns by Tara Beagan (Native Earth Performing Arts). Ruth was a recipient of the 1998 K.M. Hunter Award and the 2008 John Hirsch Director's Award. She is a graduate of the National Theatre School of Canada.

Trevor Schwellnus - set designer

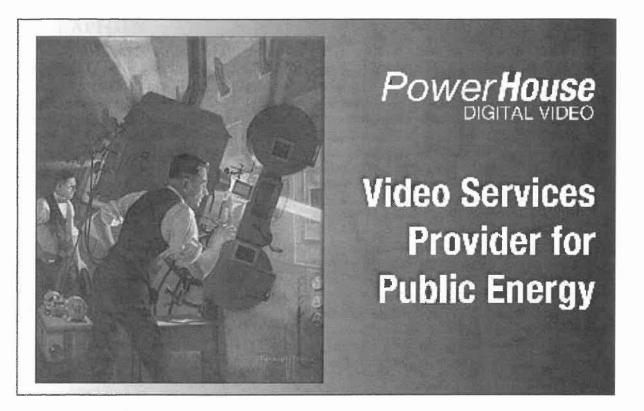
Trevor Schwellnus is a Toronto-based scenographer, designing sets, lighting, and video for theatre. He is currently Resident Designer at the Theatre Centre. He has recently worked with Alameda Theatre Refugee Hotel, Cahoots The Madness of the Square, Aluna Theatre Nohayquiensepa; Madre, Nightwood Bear With Me, Small Wooden Shoe (Dedicated to the Revolutions), La Corporacion Colombiana de Teatro, Dancemakers, Modern Times, Unspun, Independent Auntie, Obsidian, Jumblies, fu-GEN, among others; as well as with choreographers Ame Henderson, Susie Burpee Fidelity's Edge, Dead Philosopher's Limbo. His work has toured across Canada, to Colombia, and Italy. He has 2 Dora Awards for his work with Aluna. Upcoming: La Communion for Aluna Theatre and Relay! for publicrecordings.

Thomas Ryder-Payne - sound designer

Thomas Ryder Payne is a Toronto-based producer, composer, multi-instrumentalist and sound designer. He spent six years touring and recording with the Juno nominated band Joydrop, writing their top 10 single Sometimes Wanna Die and working under the wing of established producers like Ron St. Germain and GGGarth Richardson. As a producer, Thomas has focused on up-and-coming artists such as Rebekah Higgs, The Populars and Parker, among others and works mostly from his home studio. Recently, Thomas has been spending more and more time as a sound designer and composer for the theatre working with respected directors like Richard Rose and Weyni Mengesha. He won a Dora award for best Sound Design and Composition in 2008.

Bonnie Beecher - lighting designer

Bonnie has designed over 200 productions for theatre, opera and dance. She has ongoing creative collaborations with many companies across Canada including The National Ballet of Canada, The Stratford Festival, The Shaw festival, The Canadian Stage, Soulpepper theatre, Volcano theatre, Ballet Jorgen, The Canadian Opera Company, Opera Lyra, Opera Atelier, and Obsidian theatre. Her international work includes La Traviata for New Zealand Opera, Tristan und Isolde for Mannheim Opera (Germany), Woolf for the Dutch National Ballet, and 12 world premieres for the Kevin O'day Ballett - Mannheim. Recent productions include In Good King Charles Golden Days (Shaw Festival), Lootand awake and Sing (Soulpepper theatre), Love Songs (Queen of Puddings), Namesake 3 (firstthingsfirst productions), and The Magic Flute (Opera Lyra). Upcoming productions include Proarte Danza home season, The Princess and The Handmaiden (Lorraine Kisma), Perfumerie (Soulpepper), The Marriage of Figaro (Opera Atelier), One touch of Venus (Shawfestival), and The African Trilogy (Volcano theatre). Bonnie has received 11 Dora nominations and has won the award twice.



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Mathieu René - créaturiste

Regardless of medium, Mathieu René remains a Creature Maker, hence the name Créaturiste. He has always been and remains to this day, fascinated by a multitude of visual arts disciplines. Puppetry is his main field of activity, followed closely by mask. It enables him to express himself through a majority of his interest, within the same performance object. He creates, and performs as a puppeteer, for a local and international clientele. Martha Cockshutt- costume designer

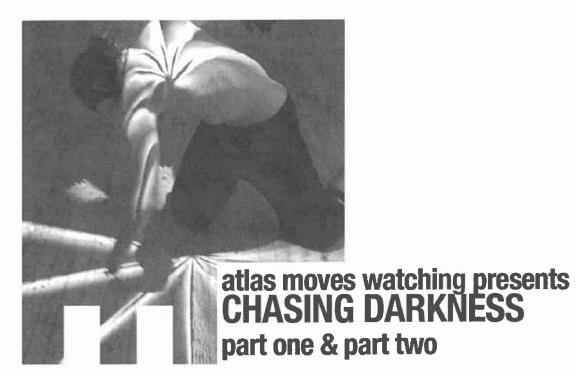
Martha Cockshutt is a Peterborough-based theatre artist. She has designed sets and costumes for theatre, dance, and performance for over 25 years, and continues to work on collaborative script development and writing. Martha began her career with Magic Circus Theatre, and was a founding member of 4th Line Theatre. In 1999 Artspace mounted Sartor Resartis a retrospective exhibition of her costumes, featuring works from 4th Line productions and collaborations with performance artist David Bateman. Martha was a co-founder of Mysterious Entity Theatre, working as a designer and co-producer. She wrote Domestic Science for the company as part of Skirting the Edge, which she also designed. Martha has been costuming dance since 1987, focussing on work with independent artists. Recent dance credits include How to Wrestle an Angel (Marie-Josée Chartier), Atlas Moves Watching (Bill James) and Canticles (David Earle) for Old Men Dancing, Oskorai for Ryan Kerr, and Performances May Be Permanent for Kate Story.

Shanna Miller - production stage manager

Shanna Miller is a Toronto-based technical director and production manager. She works in theatre and dance with companies across the country. Recent credits include Agokwe (Buddies in Bad Times Theatre), Billy Twinkle; Requiem for a Golden Boy and 10 Days on Earth (Ronnie Burkett). She is technical director for Ronnie Burkett Theatre of Marionettes and a graduate of the National Theatre School of Canada Technical Program. She feels very privileged to be part of this show. Special skills include puppet surgery, ion to express conversion, and Smitty's breakfast 'connaisseur'.

Ayelen Liberona - photographer and videographer

Born in Toronto to Chilean political refugees, Ayelen began with a career in dance. She trained in dance in Cuba, received an anthropology degree at the University of Toronto and then moved to New York City. Her work as a performer and choreographer, has been shown to wide acclaim at festivals, theatres and on television across four continents. Ayelen's obsession with the moving image lead her to film, and in 2005 she directed Falling, which premiered at 13 international film festivals. With her partner Joseph Johnson Camí, she produced the feature documentary A Grain of Sand, which fought for and saved Brendon Grimshaw's famed Moyenne Island in Seychelles. The short film Becoming (2009), supported by BravoFACT!, marks the first co-direction between Ayelen and Joseph. Becoming garnered the CFC Best Emerging Canadian Filmmaker Award (2009), and both the Miami International Short Film Festival and West Chester Film Festival's Best Experimental Film Awards. Her latest short documentary Keepers of the Water, was nominated for the Toronto International Film Festival's Emerging Filmmaker Award of 2010.

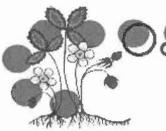

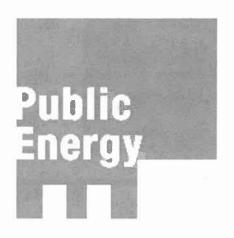

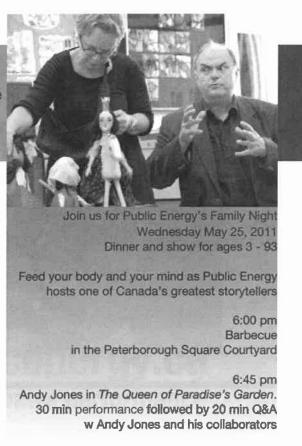
