

Peterborough New Dance (PND) is a nationally recognised animator of contemporary dance. We present an annual series of touring independent choreographers and dance companies; commission new work in concert with other Canadian presenters on the Candance Network; and host dance residencies consisting of classes, workshops, lectures and performances with visiting artists. Peterborough New Dance also supports a number of local initiatives aimed at developing dance activity in all its forms, including PND: The Space, where local performing artists can teach, rehearse and present new work; and Emergency, an annual festival of new dance and performance by area artists; and the coordination of a multi-cultural dance program for First Night Peterborough. Peterborough New Dance is affiliated with the Peterborough Arts Umbrella, a charitable agency serving Peterborough artists and arts groups. Tax deductible donations to PND can be made via the PAU. PND receives valuable operating support from the Canada Council for the Arts and the Ontario Arts Council.

Animals in isolation (like the socially isolated human prison or residential institution population) self-mutilate at high rates, and monkeys raised with inadequate social input often become self-mutilating adults. Both humans and other animals claw, head bang, scratch, gouge and bite themselves on the limbs. People, being tool users, often substitute razors or glass for teeth or claws. Monkeys that are enraged or agitated become calm after harming themselves, in a manner similar to the relief seen in most people after self-injury.
