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

Omaagomaan was developed through the Indigenous Arts residency program at the Banff Centre for the Arts in 2018 and in 2019 and at the Mskomi Giizis Residency at Native Earth Performing Arts In Toronto. Omaagomaan received its world premiere at The Gas Station Arts Centre in Winnipeg, Manitoba, in September 2019. A 2020 production of the work was cancelled due to the pandemic. This is the second presentation of the work since then.

The first was for a festival of dance and theatre from Turtle Island (Canada), the MK Festival: "Water, Earth and I", in Munich, Germany this past November.

ABOUT PUBLIC ENERGY PERFORMING ARTS:

Public Energy Performing Arts is Peterborough's animator of dance, theatre, performance and interdisciplinary work. Since 1994 we have presented a mainstage series of artists drawn from across Canada, commissioned new work in concert with other Canadian presenters on the CanDance Network, and supported the development of the local dance, theatre and performance community by presenting area artists and arranging specialized classes and community workshops, and nurtured an audience that is knowledgable and passionate about performance.

Public Energy works in Treaty 20 territory situated in the traditional territory of the Michi Saagiig and Chippewa Nations, collectively known as the Williams Treaties First Nations. We honour that we are in Nogojiwanong, which is the Anishinaabe word for "place at the end of the rapids", a gathering place where stories have been shared for millennia. We acknowledge and share our thanks to Indigenous people for their care and stewardship of these lands and waters and we recognize our responsibility to foster respectful relationships with the water, the land, and its people.

Public Energy recognizes that treaties did more harm than good, criminalizing cultural practices and displacing Indigenous people from their territories. We commit to doing all we can to repair relationships by providing a platform for Indigenous artists, in all their diversity, to share their gifts, their stories, and their histories in meaningful and respectful ways.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES:

Waawaate Fobister is an actor, dancer, playwright, choreographer, and a producer. Waawaate, meaning Northern Lights, is a proud Anishnaabe from Grassy Narrows First Nation and a Grass Dancer. He's a recipient of two Dora awards for outstanding actor and playwright, Humber College outstanding actor, and the Mark S. Bonham Centre award from University of Toronto for his work. He also has many nominations, including Ontario Premiers' Award, K.M Hunter Award and Sterling Award - Edmonton.

He trained and studied at Humber College, Banff Centre for the Arts, School of Toronto Dance Theatre, Centre for Indigenous Theatre and Kahawi Dance Theatre. He has worked for many major theatre companies across Canada. His work has taken him to many places as an artist, Japan, UK, and many coasts across Turtle Island. His work and his writings has been published, he was also a playwright-in-residency at Native Earth Performing Arts - Toronto and Magnus Theatre - Thunder Bay.


Troy Emery Twigg is Blackfoot from the Kainai Nation. He has worked as an actor, dancer, choreographer, director, dramaturg and instructor. He has most recently worked with Quest Theatre; *Into The Light* for the Banff Centre for the Arts and Creativity; *Niitahtaastsi* for Jupiter Theatre; *Lilies* for Buddies in Bad Times Theatre, Why Not Theatre and Lemon Tree Creations; *Sal Capone, The Lamentable Tragedy of...* for the National Arts Centre; *Iniskim* for the Canadian Academy of Mask and Puppetry/NAC.

He has recently worked for Toronto Dance Theatre and Raven Spirit Dance. He was asked to be part of Older and Reckless 20/50 project in progress presented by Moonhorse Dance Theatre. He was featured in Julia Aplin's film *For You*. He has worked on the direction and development with Waawaate Fobister on his new work *Omaagomaan*.

Due to the pandemic people were not able to see this important work, but is greatful it is finding its way back in. Troy has also published and worked as a curator. He was instrumental in setting up programs with the Centre for Indigenous Theatre and the University of Lethbridge. His work with Quest Theatre entitled *We Are All Treaty People* was nominated for a Dora Award in the Young Peoples Theatre division. He was curator and programmer for "The Bannock Bumms and Buddies Variety Cabaret Show Spectacular! Spectacular!" as part of Springboard Performance's Fluid Festival at the Grand Theatre this past October.













An agency of the Government of Ontario. Relève du gouvernement de l'Ontario. **Patti Shaughnessy** is a director, performer, curator, and artistic producer. She is a graduate of the Centre for Indigenous Theatre's acting program in Toronto and a former student of Trent University's Native Studies Program in Peterborough, ON.

Since 2012, Patti has been working in Nuuk, Greenland as a guest teacher and director. Directing credits for the National Theatre of Greenland include; the adaptation and direction of the theatrical interpretation of Aviaq Johnston's teen novel, *Those Who Run in the Sky*, called *Angakkussaq (To Become a Shaman)*, which toured to Toronto's Harbourfront Centre in May 2022. *Arnatsialaat, (The Rez Sisters)*, written by Tomson Highway, *Rosa Marie-p Tiquartikkaluarnera (The Occupation of Heather Rose)* written by Wendy Lil, *Anaanat A/S (Casa Matriz)*, written by Dianna Raznovich.

In July 2022, Patti directed Kisaageetin (I love you, j'taime), a retrospective of the compositions and plays by Tomson Highway at the National Arts Centre in Ottawa. In 2019, she directed the world premiere of Drew Hayden Taylor's Cottagers and Indians at Toronto's Tarragon Theatre. Patti is honoured to step in as remount director for Waawaate Fobister's *Omaagomaan*, which was recently presented at the Water, Earth, and I Festival in Munich, Germany.

Patti is a co-founder of the O'Kaadenigan Wiingashk Collective, a multidisciplinary arts collective who has produced and presented several Indigenous arts projects in Nogojiwanong, Curve Lake First Nation and abroad. These include; Mnoominkewin (the art of wild ricing) Gathering in Curve Lake First Nation (2020-2022), co-producer of the Indigenous Contemporary Scene at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival (2019), two editions of the Beats and Braids Festival (2005,2016), and the Ode'min Giizis (Strawberry Moon) Festival (2008-2012).

Patti is Anishnaabe from Curve Lake First Nation and a descendant of Irish immigrants who settled in the Peterborough region circa 1823.

Acclaimed musician and producer **Marc Meriläinen**, the creative force also known as Nadjiwan, has been making music for over 30 years. After living in Thunder Bay for the first 26 years of his life he moved to Toronto to pursue music. Marc Meriläinen's heritage can be traced to the Chippewas of Nawash, Cape Croker First Nation.

Transforming the sound and image of Indigenous music has been one of Marc Meriläinen's goals from the very beginning, and his prodigious output has been recognized in many corners, including the Canadian Aboriginal Music Awards, the Native American Music Awards, the Indigenous Music Awards, and Toronto's Dora Mavor Moore Awards for the Performing Arts, along with invitations to perform at the 2010 Vancouver Winter Olympics and the 2015 Pan-Am Games in Toronto.

Sage Paul is an urban Dene woman and a member of English River First Nation. Sage is an artist and innovative leader for Indigenous fashion, craft and textiles, championing family, sovereignty and resistance for balance. Sage is also Founder and Artistic Director of Indigenous Fashion Week Toronto. In 2017, Sage received the Design Exchange RBC Emerging Designer Award in the fashion category, was recognized by FLARE Magazine in their #HowlMadelt campaign that celebrates 100+ talented, ambitious and driven Canadian women and was honoured by the Ontario Minister of the Status of Women as a trailblazing woman who is transforming Ontario.

Some of her art and design has shown at the Royal Ontario Museum, Harbourfront Centre, The Centre for Craft, Creativity and Design (North Carolina, USA), and a curated program at Western Canada Fashion Week by Ociciwan Contemporary Art Collective. Sage has presented on Indigenous fashion, including on cultural appropriation at Canada House (London, UK), University of Johannasburg, The Walrus Magazine, Ryerson University, Brock University, Toronto Women's Fashion Week and South Africa Fashion Week.

Sage also co-founded Setsuné Indigenous Fashion Incubator; While in operation, Sage and the Setsuné collective were one of the firsts to introduce urban hide tanning to current-day Toronto. Sage also collectively curated their craft exhibit INDIAN GIVER and was a leader of the Ts'Kwe Maker's Atelier, a program by Setsuné in partnership with IKEA Canada for the economic sustainability of Indigenous women makers.

Sage loves costume designing for film and theatre and is currently working on two personal fashion-based projects: Giving Life and the Mint Sweater Project.

Pierre Lavoie has been active in dance since 1982. He started designing lighting in the 1990's for Margie Gillis under the mentorship of Nick Cernovitch and still lights all her new works as well as creating for many independent modern dance artists. For ballet, he designed for Boston Ballet, Milwaukee Ballet, Ballet BC, Royal Winnipeg Ballet amongst others.

He is currently resident lighting designer at Alberta Ballet. For opera, Pierre designed at Pacific Opera Victoria, Opera New Brunswick, Opéra de Québec, and Tapestry Singers. Pierre's most recent creative endeavor was the lighting for the Indigenous People's Experience Pavilion in Fort Edmonton.

He is honored to have designed lights for The National Arts Centre's tribute to Tomson Highway, Kisaageetin (I love you /Je t'aime).
