MENTORSHIPS

Laurel Paluck of Atelier Ludmilla works with a youth mentee at the Studio in the Attic, studying images and anatomy; drawing to produce clay models and moulds for toppers and full-sized masks; creating full-sized rat heads using papier maché and plaster casts for participants to wear during the Precarious Festival. The final process – painting the masks – is completed with local artists.

ARTSPACE

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Ryan Kerr mentors emerging theatre technicians Eryn Lidster and Shannon McKenzie throughout the festival, focussing on lighting design and operation, sound design and operation, and site-specific tech experiences.

Kate Story mentors emerging theatre director and writer Eryn Lidster as she creates her first theatre work, Invisible. Kate and Eryn met regularly throughout the creative process, which culminates in a workshop performance of this entirely original theatre work, created semi-collaboratively with the artists.

Brad Brackenridge mentors emerging puppet artist Naomi Duvall (supported by funding from Theatre Ontario) in all aspects of puppetry: research and history, building, design, and manipulation. Naomi takes part in the creation of original theatre work Festivus Rattus Rattus 2035 as a key part of the team, giving her an inside view of a collaborative creative process from beginning to end.

Multi-Media Storytelling Workshop for Girls and Young Women ages 12-16 This one-day workshop encourages girls and young women to develop their voice in the art of storytelling. Led by facilitators Sarah DeCarlo and Nicole Gibeault, 6 young Indigenous women will use photographs and video clips to tell short stories; Real or Imagined?
